# **Message from Council**

Although the Union of B.C. Municipalities (UBCM) Convention meetings with Provincial Ministers, Council, and staff are over, the work continues through staff-tostaff collaborations. Council discussed the importance of the agricultural sector to the social and economic health of the community and our priority to establish a Food Hub in Summerland. This type of agri-centre would foster innovation in value-added food processing, provide educational resources for the agricultural sector, and create employment.

We also had discussions on two other Council priorities: The progress on the proposed Recreation and Health Centre (community engagement on-site selection soon to be underway); and potential funding to support Council's reconciliation work, specifically syilx (Okanagan Peoples) interpretive and place name signage.

The Message from Council in the December newsletter will provide updates on 2021 priorities the District has completed or are well underway. January's Message will look at the year ahead—the final year of our four-year term.

Although we have been enjoying beautiful fall weather, District staff are preparing for the coming cold weather. Irrigation water is turned off, seasonal decorations will be going up after Remembrance Day, parks, beds and planters are undergoing fall clean-up, and the Fortis transmission upgrade is complete. We encourage you to prepare for winter as well. Change the battery in your fire/smoke detector; winterize your irrigation system; have your chimney swept and—especially, if you plan to gather in groups or travel for seasonal festivities—get fully vaccinated.

# George Ryga Arts & Cultural Centre

The District of Summerland and Summerland Community Arts Council hosted a celebration on October 21 to announce the completion of the building renovations at 9525 Wharton Street.

The full-scale interior renovations included HVAC upgrades, lighting, flooring, new partition walls and floor plan, accessible washrooms as well as fire and life safety improvements.

In addition to the District's Capital Reserve Fund contribution, funding support was provided by the Summerland Community Arts Council's BC Gaming Grant, Rick Hansen Foundation, and the District of Summerland Sustainability Reserve.

The Summerland Community Arts Council and Art Gallery will reside on the main floor of the renovated building. The second floor is shared space which will offer arts and cultural programs and events, recreation programs, and rental



space administered through the Arts Council.

Council recently renamed the building the George Ryga Arts & Cultural Centre. The nationally acclaimed playwright George Ryga wrote most of his major works at his Summerland home.

# Curbside Collection—unlimited Yard & Garden

Waste pickup

The **UNLIMITED** yard and garden waste curbside collection event will be the collection week of November 16 to 19.





- In "kraft" style yard waste paper bags
- In any container that is clearly marked as "yard waste only", has a volume capacity of 95L or less and a maximum weight of 25kgs
- Bundle branches, 5cm in diameter and under, with string or twine. Bundles must be less than 1.0m long and weigh less than 25kgs
- Note: Paper bags that are ripped or heavily saturated will not be collected

Materials must be placed out for collection by 7AM on your regular collection day. An additional truck will collect the extra yard waste after the garbage is collected.

The final Yard & Garden Waste Curbside Collection for 2021 is the collection week of November 30 to December 3.

## **Open Burning Permits**

Written open burning permits are issued by the Fire Department from October 15 to April 15 to properties in excess of two acres in size for the purpose of burning woody debris such a prunings.

Property owners with a written open burning permit are then required to obtain a verbal open burning permit on the day they wish to burn by calling the Fire Department at (250) 494-7211. Open burning days are regulated by regional ventilation index, issued by Environment Canada.

Burning of yard waste in residential areas, on properties less than two acres in size is strictly prohibited.

## **Winter Curbside Cart Collection**

With winter on its way, follow these guidelines for successful curbside collection. Please:

- Ensure the areas around and under your carts are clear of snow.
- Place carts as close as possible to the road, without obstructing the snow removal operations, street, sidewalk or bike lane.
- Do not place carts behind or on top of a snow bank.
- Ensure there is proper spacing around the carts:
  - o 1m (3ft) of space on all sides;
  - o 3m (10ft) of clearance above; and
  - o 0.5m (5ft) of space from a vehicle.

contractor will make every attempt to pick up waste material during winter conditions. However, their top priority is resident and employee safety.


## In the Event of a Collection Delay:

- Please place your cart(s) out each day following the delay until collection can be completed safely. Do not leave your carts at roadside as they may interfere with snow removal or emergency vehicles.
- When service is resumed, the contractor will collect any extra accumulated material, at no extra charge, equivalent to the amount that would have been collected if service had not been temporarily interrupted.

## What to do if you see a fallen power line

It's impossible to tell just by sight or sound if a power line that has fallen on the ground or become damaged is still live—it doesn't always spark, smoke, or make a buzzing sound. If you come across a downed or damaged power line, it's important to treat is as an emergency situation. Stay back at least 10m (the length of a city bus) and report it to **911**.

## Be prepared to drive in winter conditions

- Ensure your vehicle is equipped for the weather – use winter tires.
- Maintain a safe following distance by looking ahead, and keep at least 4 seconds distance.
- Reduce your speed to match road conditions – the posted speed is the maximum speed under ideal conditions.



- Watch for black ice which is especially common in shaded areas, under an overpass, and in areas where vehicles frequently stop.
- Accelerate and brake slowly to maintain traction.
- Avoid sudden moves by looking ahead to anticipate stops and turns well before they occur.
- Know how to handle a skid do not brake, ease off accelerator, and look and steer smoothly in the direction you want to go.
- See and be seen turn your vehicle lights all the way on, so your tail lights come on as well.
- Be cautious when approaching District maintenance vehicles and staff as they are trying to get you safely to your destination.

## Prepare your family for an outage

Most power outages will be over almost as soon as they begin, but some can last much longer - up to days or even weeks. Power outages are often caused by freezing



rain, sleet storms and/or high winds which damage power lines and equipment. During a power outage, you may be left without heating/air conditioning, lighting, hot water, or even running water. You may also be left without phone or internet service. If you do not have a battery-powered or crank radio, you may have no way of monitoring news broadcasts. In other words, you could be facing major challenges. You can greatly lessen the impact of a power outage by taking the time to prepare in advance. You and your family should be prepared to cope on your own during a power outage for at least 72 hours.
