

OCPs 101

- OCPs typically have the following elements
 - Aspirational
 - Articulates a community Vision and supporting Broad Goals
 - Operational
 - Identifies potential new projects/studies
 - Regulatory
 - Development Permit Areas that follow Local Government Act requirements

Current OCP

- Dates from 2008
 - Not consistent with more recently updated OCPs
 in the RDOS content and organization
 - "Thin" policy chapters (e.g., Hazard Lands)
 - Poor maps


- Who's working on it?

Electoral Area "A" Today




POPULATION & DEMOGRAPHICS

A declining population.



Between 2011 and 2016, the population shrank by about **34** people or 2%. Other Electoral Areas are growing.

POPULATION & DEMOGRAPHICS



POPULATION & DEMOGRAPHICS



People over the age of 50 are the largest proportion (46%) of the population. The median age was 58, which is 15 years older than the provincial median (43).

Climate change is a growing concern.



Area is subject to growing climate change hazards, like drought, wildfires, and heat waves.

Water supply and water quality is an issue.



Throughout South Okanagan, water supply, water quality and capacity is a major issue for current residents, new residential development, and agriculture.

Working Draft Highlights

Draft OCP


- Restructured to match other recently updated OCPs
- Background data and other information updated (population projections, new and updated Provincial Acts like Water Act, etc.)
- Chapters are the <u>same</u> as 2008 OCP except for:
 - What's an Official Community Plan
 - Community Profile
 - Local Policies
 - Vision and Broad Goals which used to be just Broad Goals
 - Aggregates and Mineral Resources which used to be a part of Industrial
- About 85% unchanged



NATURAL ENVIRONMENT - Steward and protect the area's natural features, including sensitive and endangered ecosystems, fish and wildlife habitats, and wildlife corridors

WATER RESOURCES - Protect and manage water resources, including both surface and groundwater, for residential and agricultural uses, and for ecosystem health and wellbeing

INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES - Improve and support the development of new infrastructure, including community water and sanitary sewer systems operated by the Regional District or Town of Osoyoos and improved internet connectivity.







WHAT'S CHANGED?

 Parks, Recreation, and Trails section that is consistent with other recent Electoral Area OCP updates – organization and policies (e.g., parkland dedication)

Water Resources



WHAT'S CHANGED?

 New Basin Lakes designation (across entire RDOS) to promote the major lakes in the Valley for community and visitor use, while also seeking to enhance protection and stewardship

Agriculture



WHAT'S CHANGED?

Policy to support keeping old packing plant for agricultural uses

Wellbeing - Climate Change and Hazards

WHAT'S CHANGED?

New Flood Hazard Areas (200-year floodplain)
with new 2020 modeling that incorporates new
data on how climate change is impacting
flooding





Residential Development & Growth Management

- policy to consider designating
 Anarchist Mountain Rural
 Growth Area "Village" <u>if</u> it stays
 as a Rural Growth Area after
 Regional Growth Strategy
 review.
- Village designation supports a range of housing types from row housing to apartments, commercial uses, and cultural, administrative, or institutional uses.




