CONSULTATION PLAN SOUTH OKANAGAN SUB-REGIONAL GROWTH STRATEGY

1. INTRODUCTION



The purpose of this Consultation Plan is to establish an engagement process as the Regional District reviews the South Okanagan Sub-Regional Growth Strategy (RGS) Bylaw No. 2770, 2017.

This Consultation Plan is intended to meet Sections 434(1) and (2) of the *Local Government Act* that requires the RDOS to provide consultation opportunities relating to proposed changes to a Regional Growth Strategy. Section 434(2) of the Act specifically states that:

"...as soon as practicable after the initiation of a regional growth strategy, the board must adopt a consultation plan that, in the opinion of the board, provides opportunities for early and ongoing consultation with, at a minimum, the following:

- (a) its citizens,
- (b) affected local governments,
- (c) First Nations,
- (d) boards of education, greater boards and improvement district boards, and
- (e) the Provincial and Federal governments and their agencies."

The Board is further required to consider whether the Consultation Plan should include a public hearing to provide an opportunity for individuals and organizations to make their views known before proposed amendments to the RGS are submitted for acceptance by "affected local governments".

2. ORGANIZATIONAL IDENTIFICATION

In order to satisfy the "early and ongoing consultation" requirements of the *Local Government Act*, it is being proposed that the following affected local governments, first nations, boards of education, greater boards and improvement district boards and Provincial and federal governments and their agencies be apprised of the RGS Review and given an opportunity to provide feedback:

3. ENGAGEMENT TECHNIQUES

This Consultation Plan uses a variety of techniques intended to encourage participation from a diverse cross-section of the community. The goal is to educate the community and support collaboration and communication throughout the project.

3.1 Education Techniques

- Project materials: documents and links posted on the RDOS website and RDOS Regional Connections including information releases, reports, and videos (as applicable).
- Presentations: public information meetings (live and recorded)

3.2 Communication Techniques

- Online RDOS website and/or RDOS Regional Connections: through the course of the project, all project materials will be posted online including information releases, reports, videos and other links.
- Media Releases: scheduled information releases (using the RDOS information release process*) for project updates and upcoming consultation opportunities.
- Mass notification system: app based, email, text and phone call notifications advertising upcoming events and activities
- **Social media**: schedule Facebook and Twitter posts in conjunction with the use of the mass notification system and information releases for upcoming events and activities. Ensure a dedicated staff person (or project manager) is available to answer any questions that may arise from the post. All social media posts will include links to the project page.
- **Notices**: notices will be posted on the RDOS event calendar on the RDOS website.
- **Physical copies**: Physical copies of the materials will be available at the RDOS office and the Oliver, Osoyoos, Penticton and Summerland municipal offices.

3.3 Collaboration Techniques

- **Technical Advisory committee (TAC):** will review materials and provide feedback throughout the project. The main role is to act as a sounding board for draft documents.
- **Referrals:** impacted groups or agencies will be invited to comment on draft versions of the project documents and will be asked at the beginning of the process how they wish to engage. This may include in-person or electronic meetings (including telephone)
- Interactive webpage: Q&A and feedback forms

The consultant and RDOS staff will develop materials to be shared online. **RDOS Regional Connections will act as the principal information portal for the project and provide opportunities for ongoing public engagement and feedback.**

Through the course of the project, all project materials including information releases, reports, videos and other links will be posted online.

• **Public meetings:** public information meetings will include presentations and opportunities for dialogue with participants (Q&A).

4. ACTIVITIES AND TIMING
