In the southern interior of BC, only the Northern Pacific Rattlesnake is venomous.

Be Snake Smart

How to avoid snake conflicts :

- 1. Wear boots when working in tall grass or cluttered areas.
- 2. Step around, not over, debris as snakes may be hidden on the other side.
- 3. Never put your hands where you cannot clearly see if a snake is present.
- 4. Do not harass snakes; they may bite if threatened.
- 5. If you encounter a rattlesnake, leave it alone. Report it to the foreman or manager so that the snake can be relocated.
- 6. One person should watch the snake from a distance of 3 metres so it can be tracked and relocated by the designated snake handler.

If someone is bitten :

In the unlikely event that someone is bitten by a rattlesnake, ensure you:

- 1. Remove the victim from the vicinity of the snake.
- 2. Keep the victim calm and minimize exertion.
- 3. Have someone monitor the snake's movements from a distance of 3 metres so that no one else encounters it.
- 4. Remove any constricting clothing or jewellery from the victim, especially near the bitten body part.
- 5. Inform the foreman or manager and get transportation to take the victim to hospital
- 6. Phone ahead to the hospital so they can prepare to treat the victim.
- 7. Get to the hospital as soon as possible.
- 8. DO NOT cut the wound or apply a tourniquet as this can cause medical problems.
- 9. DO NOT attempt to suck out the poison.

REMEMBER, RATTLESNAKE BITES ARE ALMOST NEVER FATAL AND RARELY CAUSE ANY LONG-TERM HARM

Snakes are Protected by law. Provincial and Federal laws make it an offence to harass or kill a snake.
